The bookstore will temporarily operate in the breezeway between the two buildings, with limited hours. Food orders may be made on a checklist and picked up at

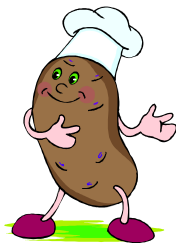

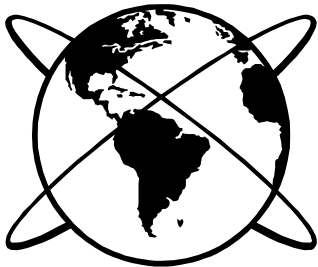
